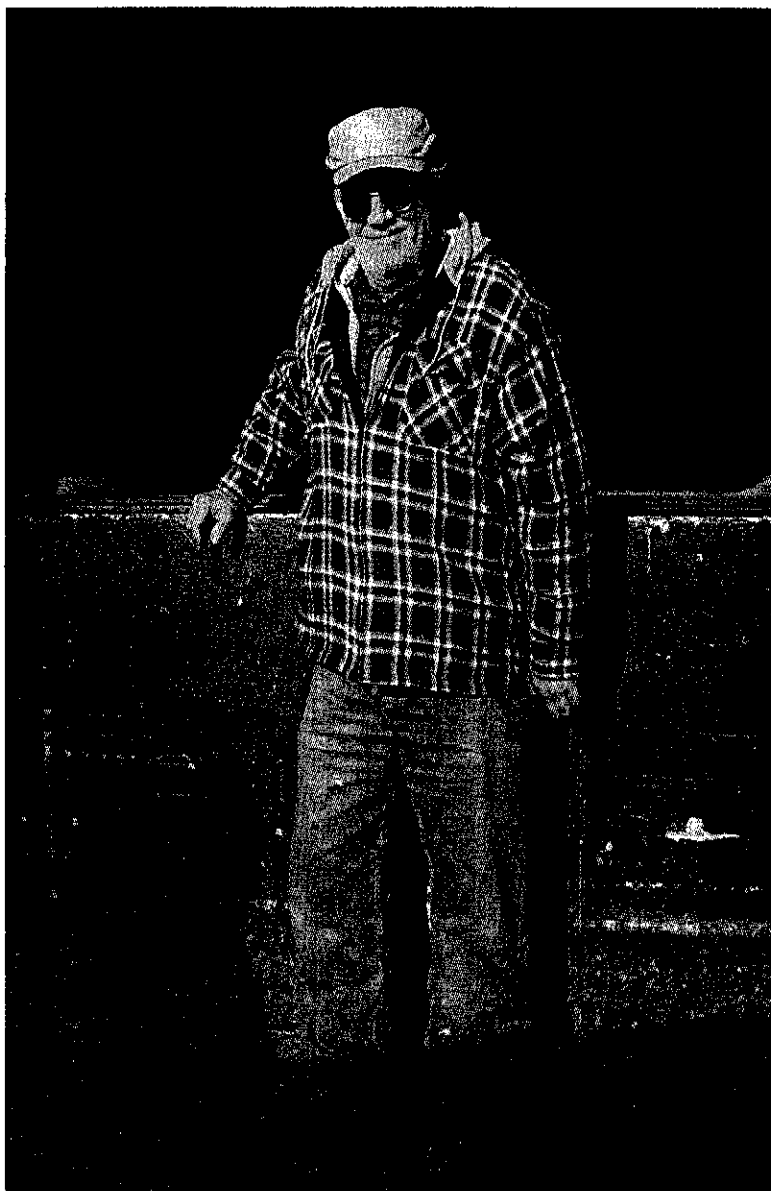

TRASH, we all have it, yet none of us want it! Unless you're Glenn that is. For Twenty two years Glenn has been taking trash from most of us. If you have visited the old Town Landfill or the Town Transfer Station then you have seen Glenn dealing with TRASH.

Glenn started working for the Town in June of 1989, of course that would have been at the old landfill that was located off Durrell Road. In November of 2000 the Town opened the Transfer Station and Glenn was "Transferred" with it.

While looking back over the dates to find when the Transfer Station opened, and when Glenn started for the Town, it was fascinating to see that of the twenty two years Glenn has been with the Town, eleven were at the Landfill and eleven have been at the Transfer Station.

Glenn has one of those jobs that entail some behind the scenes tasks that many of us don't realize. Here are but a few of those jobs which need to be done: sorting of the recyclables, chipping the brush, calling vendors to pick up the containers, picking up the trash that blows around the yard, taking and reporting of the groundwater sampling, maintenance of the containers, and the building, sanding & salting areas of the yard, shoveling, greasing equipment, cleaning, oil changing, painting, scraping and maintenance and running of the compactor.

Giving up weekends for the past 22 years could not have been easy on Glenn or his family, and warm thanks go out to them as well.

The Board of Selectmen, previous Boards of Selectmen, coworkers, office staff and the community of Tamworth thank you Glenn for your continued years of service!

2010 TOWN REPORT

2010 proved to be a challenging year for the Selectmen as well as the Town.

The economic impacts have made for a challenging year for all. The selectmen were faced with a challenging budget season and tax rate setting in hopes to alleviate some of that burden.

The Tamworth Town house was closed to town voting & meetings due to ADA compliance issues. The town will need to decide at the 2011 Town Meeting on whether or not to upgrade this building for its continued use.

The Chocorua Village Phase II & III contract has been signed with the State of New Hampshire and is currently in the engineering stage.

The Town continues to do the perambulation of the Town lines and in 2010 the Albany town line was completed. This leaves the Sandwich town line to be completed, which we expect will be done over the next two years.

The Board is pleased to announce with the cooperation of all the Boards, the Towns of Eaton, Freedom, Madison and Tamworth were all able to sign a contract for Ambulance Services for all four towns. With the success of this project we look forward to continuing to look into other options for joint services.

The Board of Selectmen would like to thank the people that have volunteered and served on the many boards and committees throughout the year. In addition we would like to thank the Employees of the Town for another great year of service.

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kenneth A. Brett School, 881 Tamworth Road, in said Town of Tamworth on Tuesday, the 8th of March, 2011, polls to be open for voting on Article 1 thru 4 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and to close not earlier than 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon, and you are hereby notified to meet at the Kenneth A. Brett School in said Town of Tamworth on Wednesday, the 9th of March, 2011, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening for the deliberative session of the Town Meeting at which time action will be taken upon the remaining articles of this warrant.

ARTICLE #1 To elect all necessary **Town Officers**, which appear on the official Town ballot for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE #2 Are you in favor of the adoption of the **Tamworth Groundwater Protection Ordinance** as proposed by the planning board?
(Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #3 Shall we adopt the provisions of **RSA 466:30-a**, which makes it **unlawful for any dog to run at large**, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such?
(Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #4 (By Petition) Are you in favor of **abolishing the Planning Board**, as proposed by petition of the voters of this town? (Majority Vote Required)

The Planning Board voted against this article by a vote of 6-0

ARTICLE #5 (By Petition) Are you in favor of **abolishing the Conservation Commission**, as proposed by petition of the voters of this town?
(Majority Vote Required)



ARTICLE #6 To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of **RSA 80:52-a**, until rescinded, allowing for the **prepayment of property taxes**. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #7 Are you in favor of **repealing warrant article #47 of the March 1984 Town Meeting**, relating to excavation as it is outdated and is superseded by the **Earth Excavation Regulations** adopted by the Planning Board on October 13, 2010? (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #8 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2002. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #9 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Recycling Capital Reserve Fund** created in 1993. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #10 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund** created in 1970. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #11 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Fire Department Land Acquisition Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2003. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #12 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Town Municipal Building Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2008. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)



ARTICLE #13 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2005. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #14 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Highway Garage Building Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2003. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #15 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Heavy Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2004. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #16 To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue the Highway Equipment Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund** created in 2008. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town of Tamworth's general fund. (Majority Vote Required)

The voters of the Town recognize that in fiscal year 2010 the VNA-Hospice provided 823 home health care, hospice and/or child health visits to citizens of the Town. They also recognize that the number of town residents with no or limited health insurance have been rising. The VNA-Hospice utilizes the Town's allocation to assist the agency in continuing to provide home care, hospice and child health services to the citizens of the Town who are without adequate insurance coverage to meet the costs of providing the services. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE #38

(By Petition). To see if the Town of Tamworth will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,500 for the support of Tamworth children, ages 5 - 12, using the Out-of-School Hours, School-Aged childcare services at **Bearcamp Valley School and Children's Center (Tamworth Preschool Inc.)**, a non-profit organization. These services include before and after school, vacation weeks and summer programs for Tamworth Children ages 5 - 12. This request does not include any preschool programming. (Majority Vote Required)

(By Petition). To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,500 to assist **Agape Ministries' Food Pantry** in their assistance to Tamworth residents. (Majority Vote Required)

To see if the Town of Tamworth will vote to include in the annual budget the sum of \$5,000 (five thousand dollars) to support **Life Bridge, Inc.** Life Bridge is a mentoring organization serving students in the Kenneth A. Brett School. Life Bridge supports at-risk students Grades 6 through 8 with one to one mentoring services and offers students healthy group



events aimed at helping curb delinquency and risky behaviors. Life Bridge has provided a full-time staff person to oversee the program which currently Life Bridge serves about 30+ families from Tamworth. (Majority Vote Required)

Town Clerk/Tax Collector 2010 Annual Report

In moving forward, I will continue to comment on how important it is to keep updated with the legislative changes & procedures that pertain to the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's position. The following are the workshops and conferences attended this year:

March 27 - NH Tax Collectors Spring Workshop
June 18 - Regional Town Clerk Conference
July 26 - Election Law Training
August 9-13 NH Town Clerk/Tax Collector Joint Certification Program
September 22-24 - NH Tax Collectors Assoc. Annual Conference
October 13-15 - NH Town Clerk Assoc. Annual Conference
October 18 - Dog Licensing Webinar

As mentioned in 2009, the Single Payment method was approved by the State of NH for the collection of Motor Vehicle Registration Fees in the Town of Tamworth. The Town Clerk's Office found this to be a welcome service to our Residents, and the "one check" method proved effective both over the counter and on-line as well. In January 2010, our office was able to implement the "E-Reg" program allowing for the renewal of Motor Vehicle Registrations to be requested on-line through an ACH payment process. Although still a new program, we have had adequate response with its use. The collection of a Municipal Agent Fee, in it's second year, shows approximately 85% of the town's people are taking advantage of the program, and has generated \$9,425.00 in revenue for the Town of Tamworth. With the future growth of different payment methods for not only Motor Vehicle Registrations but for Property Tax Collection, Dog Licensing, and Vital Records, we hope to have the Debit/Credit Card program implemented by early 2011. This would be for both over-the-counter and on-line transactions. The Town Clerk's Office continues to provide certified copies of Vital Records, Motor Vehicle Registration, New Voter Registration, Local & State Election information, Dog Licensing, Marriage Licenses, Facilities Permits, and Genealogy Research Records. The Tax Collector's office provides for the collection of property taxes, requests for tax bills & statements, and answers to questions in regard to the lien and deed process.

In closing, I'd like to say that in addition to our usual services 2010 was another busy year filled with Elections and the computerization of the Dog Licensing program. Again, I would like to thank my Deputy Libby Hauser who throughout 2010 continues to be supportive in helping me to offer more opportunities for our residents. As always it remains the goal of the Town Clerk/Tax Collectors Office to try to improve services for the residents of Tamworth both in a cost effective manner and while complying with the requirements of the NH State Statues. As always please give the office a call with any questions, concerns, or suggestions you may have. Thanks again for your support!

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS & CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS

2010 REPORT

As Trustees, we are currently responsible for the safekeeping and investment of approximately \$776,087 in trust and reserve funds. The details of these funds are shown on the accompanying schedules. As of December 31, 2010, we were holding \$556,242 for such purposes as cemetery maintenance, library, and school funds. In addition, we were holding \$219,845 in capital reserve and other funds. These are non-permanent funds established for such Town purposes as purchasing department equipment, making bridge repairs, land acquisition, and revaluation; and permanent funds for specific purposes such as park maintenance, and rescue squad equipment.

The majority of our funds are invested in the NH Public Deposit Investment Pool. For 2010, the average annualized yield was less than 0.3%. The Cemetery Funds are in a local bank money market account and received a slightly better return of 0.57%.

The Trustees would also like to thank the individuals who maintain the cemeteries and Veterans Memorial and acknowledge their "personal pride" in doing their work:

- Michal Stepien · Town (Ordination) & Riverside Cemeteries.
- Divided Sky · Chocorua (113), Fowlers Mill (113A) & Wonalancet Cemeteries.
- Tony Eldridge Jr. · Bunker Hill Rd. (2), Chocorua (16), Fowlers Mill Rd, Great Hill Rd., Hemingway Rd., Mountain Rd., Pease Hill Rd. (2), Pine Woods Rd., Washington Hill & Whittier Rd. Cemeteries. While Tony, Jr., was laid up after an automobile accident; his Mom, Linda, and Dad, Tony, Sr., maintained his cemeteries under his supervision.
- Rod's Countryscapes · Veterans Memorial. Rod Fawson generously donated and maintained the flower bed while his crew kept the Memorial groomed. David Bowles and Dave Haskell hauled water in order to keep the Veterans Memorial green and the flowers from dying, after shutting the sprinkler system off due to a yard watering ban.

On February 13, 2010, FairPoint Communications removed their utility pole from the Veterans Memorial. We not only owe them a debt of gratitude, but also Public Service of NH and Time Warner Cable for all of their labor and materials in order to accomplish such a great task during the coldest part of the year in honoring our Tamworth Veterans. We also want to thank DUCO Property Management as the electric service on one of their properties had to be changed.

A Big Thank You to the following: Mike Davis generously donated his time and materials refurbishing the metal gate for the old Town Cemetery on Hollow Hill Rd. Bob Hammond moved three loads of loam from in back of the Town Office to Chocorua (2) and Ordination (1) Cemeteries. Joan Casarotto is always available for cemetery inquiries and is a valuable asset for the Cemetery Commissioners. Harold Cook is always in the background when needed for his world of wealth of cemetery information. Chris Clyne, staff and volunteers of Cook Memorial Library, and Friends of the Library have been working on the old Town Cemetery matching names to headstones on a map with only headstones. For their second year, Boy Scout Troop 151 removed and placed the American flags on the Veterans' graves throughout the Town Cemeteries honoring our Veterans.

We were unable to find a replacement for Harold Cook and thus have operated as a two-person committee. We hope someone will come forth to assist us.

The Capital Improvements Program (CIP) is a valuable part of town planning and budgeting. The CIP bridges the gap between planning and spending, between the visions of the Master Plan and the fiscal realities of maintaining, improving, and expanding our community facilities.

The CIP report includes anticipated expenditures and funding for capital projects for the next 6 years, suggested warrant articles and tax rate effects, as well as funding alternatives and descriptions of projects for voters and Selectmen. It is non-binding, advisory, and updated annually. Inclusion of projects and finances in the report does not commit the Town to funding or expenditures. Projects are categorized and prioritized by need and urgency and reviewed annually.

The CIP Committee is required to report to the Planning Board and Selectmen annually.

Report of the Planning Board 2010

The purpose of the Planning Board is to administer land use regulations that have been adopted by the people of Tamworth.

To that end the Planning Board held numerous hearings this year to consider:

- 5 Subdivisions
- 7 Boundary Line Adjustments.
- 2 Special Use Permits and 2 Waivers under the Wetlands Ordinance
- 1 Cell Tower application
- 1 Scenic Road tree cutting application.

This year the Planning Board spent considerable time drafting regulations and ordinances:

- In response to a mandate from the State of NH, that the Town come in to compliance with RSA 155-E (which governs the operation of Gravel Pits), the Planning Board developed the Tamworth Earth Excavation Regulations. The regulations were drafted with considerable input from local Gravel Pit Owner/Operators. There were five public hearings to accept comments and make revisions to the final document adopted by the Board. These regulations bring us into compliance, and will replace the current Earth Excavation Ordinance, which the Planning Board recommends that voters at Town Meeting rescind.
- With the help of the Conservation Commission and Lakes Region Planning Commission, the Planning Board developed a Ground Water Protection Ordinance, based on the State model ordinance. There were three public hearings held, to accept public comments, and make further revisions so the ordinance reflects local concerns and circumstances. The final version will be voted on Election Day.
- The Land Use Regulation Committee, made up of three Planning Board members and four citizens, spent considerable time this year researching and drafting a Tamworth Zoning Ordinance. Two public hearings were held, and there was considerable public interest. The Board decided that the current draft needs more work, and will not be on the ballot this year.

The Capital Improvement Program Committee finished writing this year's CIP report in October. The Planning Board held a public hearing and presented the final report to the selectmen November 11th.

The elected members, alternates, and volunteers from the community have spent countless hours in meetings, work sessions, and public hearings, working to administer existing ordinances, and plan for our future. Your input in that process is always welcome.

Tamworth Zoning Board of Adjustment

Annual Report 2010

In March, the selectmen reconvened the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) after a hiatus of several years in order to update forms related to rules of procedure and applications for variance, special exceptions and administrative appeals so that the language was in alignment with current RSAs and town ordinances.

Over the course of the next several months, the ZBA reviewed materials available, including related RSAs; ensured that the RSA citations in our materials were still pertinent and noted in current language; reviewed and revised the rules of procedure (in process); and reviewed town ordinances and created forms, using the town's template, for special exception, administrative appeal, and variance requests.

In April, the ZBA and Planning board held a joint hearing regarding an application from AT&T for the installation of a cell tower, or personal wireless service facility, on Durrell Road. AT&T proposed a 70' monopine tower with an unmanned equipment compound. In order to build this tower, a special exception for the height restrictions outlined in the ordinance was requested and ultimately unanimously granted.

The ZBA met a total of 9 times this year and, as the majority of the work set before us is complete, will not meet again until April 2011. Members appointed to the ZBA are John Mersfelder (chair), George Plender (vice chair), Lianne Prentice (clerk), Tom Daley, and Harry Miller. Danny Dineen served as alternate.

2010 Tamworth Fire Department Annual Report

The Fire Department had 195 emergency calls this year which is down a few from 2009, and a few more than in 2008, so overall it was an average year from a call standpoint.

At the most serious fires this year it was very evident how valuable our investment in equipment and well-trained personnel are. There are several nice buildings in town that would not be standing today if we were fighting fires with 1980's equipment and technology. In addition to the positive impact on insurance rates that saving these buildings has, these buildings are part of the history and character of our Town and it would be a shame to loose them.

Fire Chief Richard Colcord was deployed as a Combat Medic in the 197th Fires Brigade of the Army National Guard in September. On Christmas day, he informed us that so far he's been in Kuwait and Iraq on combat and support missions.


Being without a full time chief, even on a temporary basis has been a challenge for the Fire Department. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the officers and firefighters for really stepping up and putting forth the extra effort to keep the stations and equipment maintained and to keep the personnel properly outfitted and trained during Richard's absence. It is impressive to see how the same people who already volunteer hundreds of hours each year, dig deep to help out even more. I think a firefighter summed up the mentality one day when we were working late to return a piece of equipment to service and he said, "the way I look at it, if Richard has to leave his family and risk his life to protect the country, the least we can do is dedicate a little more of our life to protect the town".

This year with the help of Tamworth Wireless and a fully funded grant from the Tamworth Foundation, we began the process of permitting and installing a local radio repeater on the Great Hill Fire Tower. Using mobile-to-mobile radio communications is difficult to impossible in many areas of Town due to the size and topography. As a result, basic radio traffic, critical to assembling an organized response cannot take place. The incident commander often does not know which volunteers are going to pick up which

apparatus and sometimes apparatus is delayed in reaching the emergency because firefighters assume that someone else is closer to the apparatus and will pick it up. At this point, we are waiting for the frequency license from the FCC and Special Use Permit from the State. The bids for the work have been received and assuming that the permits are received over the winter, the repeater will be installed right after mud season in 2011.

The Fire Department's number one priority is to prevent fires. The most common cause of fire in Tamworth this year was carelessness. Dirty and improperly maintained chimneys, candles, improper outdoor burning, and excess grass buildup on a lawn mower were the top four causes of damaging fire this year. Losses from the incidents range from very low to hundreds of thousands of dollars. Losses were minimized by the quick and efficient response of our Chief, the Volunteers, and Firefighters from surrounding communities but most of these fires were preventable. We can suggest and encourage fire safety but ultimately it is you that takes or does not take steps to prevent fires. Be diligent in maintaining proper clearances around heating devices, check your smoke detectors and chimneys often, and plan and practice two escape routes from every bedroom.

TAMWORTH RESCUE SQUAD 2010 ANNUAL REPORT

Tamworth Rescue Squad is an all-volunteer department which services the citizens of Tamworth and surrounding towns by belonging to Ossipee Valley Mutual Aid Association. Tamworth Rescue Squad responds to requests from OVMAA along with Lifestar Ambulance for assistance with medical support, transports and evaluation of patients. We would like to thank Lifestar Ambulance for their service to the town. January 1, 2011 we started working with CarePlus (dba North Conway Ambulance) who will be the contracted ambulance service for the Town of Tamworth and look forward to working with them as a team.

This year Tamworth Rescue Squad received 365 calls from Carroll County Dispatch. 262 medical calls, 51 motor vehicle accidents, 42 fire assists and 10 mutual aid requests. Each year our call volume surpasses the previous year, this year remains consistent with the trend. We have also seen an increase in patient acuity related to shorter hospitalizations and more serious medical conditions.

Elected officers for 2011 are Captain Jeffrey Tavares, 1st Lieutenant Shawn Taylor and 2nd Lieutenant Dana Littlefield.

Along with the required trainings for members to keep with the current State of NH licensing laws some members have taken extra trainings. We still have three American Heart Association CPR/AED Instructors to continue trainings for the department and the town. Other trainings were water rescue at Chocorua Lake and we had training with Conway Fire at Monkey Trunks. Inter-department trainings increase teamwork and familiarity with other department's equipment and personnel.

Thank You! To the families of our very dedicated volunteer members. It is not easy on the families every time the call for help goes out and the member leaves the family to help other people. We appreciate all their support and sacrifice.

Another reminder to help us find your house more efficiently we will continue to sell the 911 signs throughout the year so they can be posted near the road and should be free from obstruction.

For 90 years, the Tamworth Community Nurse Association has offered Tamworth residents a wide range of services —with no fee for service to the patient. In fact, we try to save you money. Some of you may have noticed that this fall seasonal flu shots were being advertised for \$38.00 in North Conway, while Tamworth residents received inoculations for less than cost at \$15.00. In addition, many residents take advantage of ordering medical supplies that are not covered by insurance through our office and have realized considerable savings over the retail market. Think about giving us a call, no matter what your healthcare need. There's a good chance that we can help you in some way.

The handicapped accessible TCNA Office at the back of the Town Office Building is open Monday through Thursday from 9:00 to 2:00 and from 9:00 to 11:00 on Fridays. A nurse is available in the office everyday from 9:00 to 11:00. Appointments are not necessary and all issues are treated with strict confidentiality. We assist people of all ages from newborns to seniors with no regard to economic strata. Stop in or contact us at 323-8511 or tamworthnurses@yahoo.com. Our web site is tamworthnurses.org.

Dr. Brian Irwin of Tamworth Family Medicine is our Medical Director. Our nursing staff includes Joan Peters, RN, Carol Eldridge, LPN and myself. Dave Deveau is our administrative assistant and coordinator of the Meals-On-Wheels program. It is a pleasure to work with this competent and committed team. Each of us plays an integral part in the services TCNA provides to Tamworth residents.

Our Board of Directors meets monthly to direct agency functions and operations and handle financial matters, as well as assisting with fund raising events. The 2010 members of our Board of Directors were Chele Miller, Chair, Kent Hemingway Sr., Vice Chair, Cathy Baybutt, Treasurer, Bob Seston, Asst. Treasurer, Geoffrey Burke, Secretary, Tracey Little, Lorraine Streeter, Leslie

Johnson, Howard Trask, and Marge Mather. Although they receive little recognition, their endless efforts in support of the work of this fine organization make our services possible.

The Department of Health and Human Services conducted its annual inspection in October. They reviewed our charts, policies and procedures, infection control and quality assurance. We are pleased to announce that we were once again deficiency-free.

We coordinate Meals on Wheels, an essential service to many town residents who, without the benefit of this service, would be hungry or at risk of malnutrition. This program also serves as a regular safety check. There were 12,211 meals delivered to town residents in 2010 by 21 volunteer drivers. We always need more volunteers to work a flexible schedule once a month. It only takes approximately two hours to complete the route, and the opportunity to serve others is a rewarding.

TCNA continues to function as the Salvation Army Unit station for the area. Emergency funds are available for Tamworth and Sandwich residents in need. This year we have assisted people by providing medication, therapy, groceries and medical equipment.

During the holidays, we deliver gifts to our clients. Special thanks to the Elan Publishing and Northway Bank employees, and The Tamworth Community Christmas Project for their support to this program. We also worked closely with St. Andrew's Food Pantry in distributing more than twenty Thanksgiving food baskets.

TCNA interacts and coordinates services with the Tamworth Caregivers, ServiceLink, Tri- County Cap, and RSVP, to name a few. These organizations have provided support to many area residents and serve as important members of the health care team.

Don't forget we have our "loaner closet". Wheelchairs, commodes, walkers, canes, crutches and miscellaneous items are available free of charge. We appreciate all who have donated items and encourage all residents to borrow needed equipment and supplies.

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association is a private, not for profit, non-certified company. This means we do not bill individuals, Medicare/Medicaid or insurance companies. Much preventative care and social service support which your neighbors often need to maintain active and healthy lives is not covered by the major insurance companies. Regional health agencies, including the VNA, regularly contact us to care for patients in Tamworth whose coverage has been terminated. TCNA saves money for our clients while providing services and support they might not otherwise be able to afford.

It is the mission of TCNA to care for all Tamworth residents, including those who, for any number of reasons, fall between the cracks of the health care system. We provide the safety net. We are well known to area hospital discharge planners and work cooperatively with them to provide optimal home care. Because we are not Medicare certified we do not provide ancillary services such as occupational, physical, and speech therapy, home health aides/homemakers, and hospice. For these services we rely on area agencies such as the VNA's, and Carroll County Health & Homecare Services. Close communication and collaboration allow us to provide continuity and holistic care. We are grateful for the cooperative efforts extended to us by these agencies.

In 2010, we published "Who's Who in Tamworth" calendar dedicated to Steve and Ginnie Damon. Copies are available at the Other Store, the Town Clerks office and the TCNA office. In 2011 we have several fun events planned so save these dates: February 27th 11:30am-2:20pm - a Pizza Party at Chequers Villa! Our Annual Meeting will be at the Brass Heart Inn on August 24th at 6:30pm. Of course we will have music, a look back at TCNA over 90 years and blueberry ice-cream. The 3rd Annual Concert to Benefit TCNA will be held at 7pm Saturday, September 10th at The Barnstormers Theater and lastly our Holiday Gala will take place on Friday, December 2nd with the location to be announced closer to the date. These events serve as fundraisers for TCNA but they also do so much more. They help build grassroots support while giving us all a chance to recognize what an extraordinary and unique organization TCNA is. Tens of thousands of Tamworthians and generations of residents have benefitted from its' service. Please, write these dates down and plan to join us as TCNA enters its' 9th decade caring for Tamworth.

As always, we deeply appreciate the support of the people of Tamworth and pledge to continue our efforts to work for the health and well being of the community and of each Tamworth resident.

Tamworth Volunteer Energy Commission (TVEC)

The Tamworth Volunteer Energy Committee (TVEC), was established by the Town in November 2007 as the result of a Resolution Relative to Climate Change, adopted in February, 2007. The Tamworth Master Plan 2007 survey had 91.3% respondents support energy conservation and 81.9% responded that the Town should promote Alternative Energy. In November 2009 TVEC became a *Commission*. Meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of the Month, 7 pm at the Tamworth Town Office.

TVEC Mission Statement

Investigate the use of energy in the town. Recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions. Promote the use of renewable energy in public buildings, businesses and homes. Reach out to the community through education. Coordinate the creation of a town energy plan.

As Volunteers, we take pride in being able to provide resources and information for the residents of Tamworth by examining ways the Town can reduce energy consumption by identifying and recommending to the Board of Selectmen short term and long term solutions for Town buildings and energy consumption with cost savings: Reduced Energy Consumption, Integration of alternative energy, Energy Efficiency Education and Ecological Impacts. TVEC is also available to identify and provide educational opportunities, research and recommend funding options for education, research and recommend funding options for institution of new energy efficient solutions, research and identify tax incentives for residents or businesses that undertake energy conservation improvements, work with Conservation Commission and Planning Board to identify energy efficient and sustainable design suggestions, explore "green technologies" as part of any new municipal building project and report on same to the Board of Selectmen, evaluate costs and benefits of these options, develop a set of measurable criteria for workable solutions of municipal changes to evaluate costs.

It has been a busy year. TVEC has set about educating themselves and the residents on the current state of energy use by the Town and municipal buildings in an attempt to develop a baseline energy use. The Commission conducted workshops to review information provided from other committees, as well as hear from guest speakers on their experiences on the topic. Please join us on the journey exploring Alternative Energy.

Exhibits / Presentations: *Insulation Energy Saver Boards* crafted by Commission members Edward Maduskuie, of ESM Electric Inc. and Solar Works and Sam Sayers of B.E.A.M. Construction, to exhibit ways to reduce energy loss. Demonstrate lighting options, insulation options, and more. *Spend a Penny Save a Dime* presentation considering everyday changes in behavior and purchasing practices resulting in reduction in energy consumption and real money saving possibilities. *'Recycled' Solar Hot Water Collector* demonstrated at the Mad Planter by ESM Electric & Solar Works - on how to extend your growing season. The parts to make the solar hot water collector were recycled, reclaimed, and donated parts. Lecture included PowerPoint presentation documenting the progression and components of the design. ***Information Kiosk*** During the course of the year, TVEC could be found spreading the word at events such as the July 4th Family Day, July 25th Chocorua Day and Tamworth Farmers Market, House Hold Hazard Waste Day. During these events TVEC reach out to the community, providing educational materials, PowerPoint presentations, a lot of smiles and conduct an „Energy Knowledge Survey“.

Street Lighting TVEC presented a proposal to the Town of Tamworth that identified street light locations with a conversion or reduction proposal to reduce operating cost to the residents of Tamworth. This proposal was complete with an informative PowerPoint presentation by Chris Conrod detailing current street light positions along with details on what cost savings may be incurred with modification to the existing street light configurations or eliminations. **Vehicle Idling** With permission of landowners, town and government offices "No idling" signs have been placed in strategic locations throughout the town such as Post Offices, school, and libraries and in collaboration with the Town Clerk an informational notice about idling in relation to emissions is available to each person who registers their vehicles. **Energy Fair** The first annual K. A. Brett School Energy Fair of 2010 was a landmark event with the convergence of young minds curious about energy conservation, TVEC and the community of like minds interested in the future. The First Annual „Energy Fair“, brought together students, teachers, businesses, and the community to look at sustainability within the residential, agricultural, and business arenas to explore directions and innovation in Alternative Energy, which is rapidly emerging as the focus of crucial green initiatives and future jobs. The key components of the „Energy Fair“ have been listening to the next generation, understanding energy consumption through education, and awareness with the promotion of energy efficiency and changing behavior practices both at home and in the work place. **NH Carbon Challenge** The K.A. Brett School invited TVEC to join them in the *NH Carbon Challenge*. The Commission has been very active in promoting the program and inviting individuals and businesses to enter the NH Carbon Challenge through Churches, Greater Ossipee Area Chamber of Commerce, Altrusa, Tamworth Exchange, print and online communication, information kiosks, workshops and handouts. www.carbonchallenge.sr.unh.edu. **The 'Gift of Light' Project** Can a light bulb change the world? Well, it is a step. The CFL light bulb distribution was a big success - starting at the Town Meeting in the Spring of 2009. You may recall the project of distributing free CFL 13W bulbs to households at 2009 Town Meeting and then again at workshops. In concert with Hazardous Waste Disposal, included in a handout bag, were instructions for handling broken bulbs and also a list of where collection centers are located. This was funded by a grant and the rebate program from Earthmate. A display was created to demonstrate the difference of energy consumption between an incandescent bulb and a CFL. **'Energy' Analysis** In our mission to assist the Town of Tamworth identify areas where energy consumption, emissions and costs can be reduced, it became apparent that one of the tasks would be to provide the Town with a detailed breakdown of its current energy consumption in the town buildings as well as fuel consumption in the vehicles. Not wanting to burden the Town with more expenses and adding more work for the Town Office, LighTec, Inc. of Merrimack, NH was contacted and performed an Energy Analysis for the Town at no cost. The Energy Analysis began October of 2009. LighTec, Inc. presented an Energy Analysis Report to the Town of Tamworth for review as a baseline of energy consumption. **Tamworth Energy Commission Public Forum** A special Q&A session at the Tamworth Town Hall discussing "Energy Conservation and Solar Energy Generation", "How & Why Solar Hot Water and Photovoltaic Systems Sighting Requirements" with a brief Overview of systems economics, cost to install incentives and available payback resources presented by Carl McNall and Kim Frase, Frase Electric LLC.

Future Plans: Carbon Tracking Strategy, One, Five and Ten Year Plan... with more to come.

DID YOU KNOW? The incandescent light bulb has been around in its original form for more than a century. But like many inventions that have drastically changed the quality of life, old technologies are being phased out to make way for newer, more environmentally friendly models. As a result, the light bulb as we know it is about to become obsolete. But fret not: There will be no light-bulb police knocking at your door. Consumers can continue to use the 100-watt incandescent bulbs they have, and stores can continue to sell them, until they run out of stock.

The Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (EISA) - passed by Congress and signed by President George W. Bush - created new energy efficiency standards for light bulbs. The law is designed to reduce energy use and greenhouse gas emissions and make the U.S. less dependent on foreign sources of energy. The entire country will adopt this standard on January 1, 2012. Improving energy efficiency reduces utility bills, our dependence on fossil fuels, the need to build costly new power plants, and the emissions of harmful and polluting greenhouse gases.

Newer bulbs are more efficient and make the traditional 100-watt incandescent bulb obsolete. Around 90% of the electricity used by traditional incandescent bulbs is wasted as heat instead of visible, usable light. More efficient bulbs produce the same amount of light but waste less energy in the form of heat. CFLs and LEDs are safe to use if handled and used properly. CFLs do use very small amounts of mercury. In the event a CFL is broken, follow these clean-up steps from by the EPA. Many large retailers - including Home Depot, IKEA, and Lowe's - will recycle CFLs bulbs free.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION 2010 TOWN REPORT

One of the Commission's continuing goals is to help ensure the continued high level of water quality in Tamworth. The TCC continues to support the Green Mountain Conservation Group (GMCG) annual surface water quality monitoring. In 2010, the GMCG reported that we continue to have high quality surface water, but noted a continuing threat from road salt. There was good progress in 2010 on addressing this issue, and the TCC applauds the Selectmen and Road Agent and town employees for increasing their knowledge of the issue and their reductions in road salt use.

Everyone shares the interest in ensuring safe drinking water for generations to come and continued high water quality for ongoing recreation. One of our goals this year has been to create the proposed Groundwater Protection Ordinance, with the Planning Board, creating local best management practices that work with the local wetlands ordinance and state regulations - but do not duplicate them. We have listened to a diversity of input during public hearings about the proposed ordinance, and have made many improvements to create something that is not overly intrusive, but will help reduce the risk of contamination of groundwater. Details about the ordinance are available at the TCC's website (see address below) section on "Groundwater." Tamworth has very few local restrictions. We do have a wetlands ordinance that has helped ensure local focus on protecting surface water quality. We do not have the same yet for groundwater. If there is one resource we want to take some extra efforts to conserve, it is water. Adding the proposed groundwater protection ordinance completes the set of local water protections.

EASEMENTS:

Conservation easements are the preferred tool for protecting special natural areas from development, while keeping the land in private ownership and on the tax rolls. In 2010 The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests (SPNHF) purchased the 130-acre Gilman Forest property, formerly owned by the late Robert Freeto, along the Mill Brook and Hackett Hill Road. The purchase was secured with help from local private fundraising efforts aided by the TCC. The Society then granted a conservation easement to the town, thus preserving the trail network and public access. This property is adjacent to other significant wildlife conservation areas and is an important piece of the "Whites-to-Ossipees" wildlife connectivity initiative that the Commission has played a role in moving forward. The Commission is grateful to almost 150 donors who made this project possible.

The Commission also responded to the request of a life-long South Tamworth resident interested in conserving some of his lands. As the Town Warrant goes to press, one piece of his land is being placed in conservation through sale to a local non-profit which is donating a conservation easement to the Town. This parcel also fits into the "Whites-to-Ossipees" wildlife connectivity initiative.

The Commission has not actively sought out conservation opportunities, but does respond to landowners who approach the Commission about protecting lands that meet its conservation priorities of protecting shorelands and/or the Whites-to-Ossipees wildlife connectivity. We thank the landowners who have worked with the Commission over the years in creating protected areas that support sustainable forestry, agriculture, recreation, and public access for the future.

TRAILS:

The TCC continues to maintain trails on a number of conservation easements and town owned properties. Commission members and other volunteers did the regular spring and fall trail cleanups and maintenance. Trails to the Great Hill Fire Tower, which the TCC maintains, got additional attention this year, including new signs and a map at the Hemenway "four corners," from which the easiest trail leads to the Tower. New map boxes were placed at most trailheads.

Members of the TCC worked with the Bearcamp Trackers to explore the feasibility of creating a trail on the property occupied by the town transfer station. The lot is approximately 90 acres and climbs to upper edges of the Ossipee Ring Dike. The transfer station only uses about ten acres at the bottom of the slope. The rest of the lot is heavily forested, with some rocky ledges and a few streams. Unfortunately, due to the heavy forest, there are no good views from the top, so it is unclear what benefits a trail might offer. The Selectmen are considering options.

The TCC also partnered with the Tamworth Outing Club to complete critical maintenance on the woods road/trail up Page Hill. This trail, which leaves from a point on Page Hill Road, is on private property, but the Commission has permission to maintain the trail for public use. Because of excessive vehicle use, severe and eroding ruts have developed in steeper sections. Waterbars were installed that should help stabilize the trail. A few intruding trees were cut, and a gate was installed at the bottom of the trail at Page Hill Road. The trail is currently closed to vehicles to allow it to stabilize. Non-motorized use is fine, as always, thanks to the generosity of the landowners. The view from the end of the trail at the top of the former ski slope is very much worth the 20-minute hike.

WETLANDS:

During the year, the Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) reviewed a few applications for Septic Waivers, Special Use Permits, and state Dredge and Fill Permits, as required by state and local ordinances. Most involved site visits by one or more commissioners. In addition, instances of work in wetlands in violation of local and state ordinances were investigated by Commission members, and the Commission worked with the state Department of Environmental Services and the Selectmen to get them corrected.

OTHER:

Two new members, Chele Miller and Margaret Rieser, joined the Commission. Commissioner Kathy Bunker retired late in the year. TCC Administrative Assistant Susan Ticehurst left the Commission after two years of fine work in organizing files, taking minutes, and more; she was replaced by Chris Conrod.

Chairman Ned Beecher and Alternate Bryan Berliand continue to serve on the town's Ordinance Review Committee, which is working to streamline local ordinance and application processes; that Committee's work is expected to finish early in 2011.

The Commission continues to monitor the emissions at the old town dump/landfill on Durrell Road. This involves taking methane, carbon dioxide, and other readings at sixteen locations in and around the landfill four times each year. This effort saves the town from having to pay professionals to do the work.

The TCC had a booth at the Family Day festivities on July Fourth. Trail maps and brochures were available, and volunteers were sought for Household Hazardous Waste Day and for the Energy Committee.

The TCC once again participated in the county-wide Household Hazardous Waste Day, helping on the Lakes Regional Planning Commission committee that organizes the event and providing volunteers to the Meredith collection site the first Saturday in August.

The TCC's work depends entirely on volunteer involvement. All members contribute their time, and numerous additional volunteers help with different tasks throughout the year. We thank each and every one of these volunteers for all they have done to help preserve the natural resources and lands under Town stewardship. Best Friends

On a dusky November evening, the Cook Memorial Library in Tamworth, ablaze with lights and warmth within, celebrated their first-place win of the New Hampshire Library Trustees Award for Friends of the Library.

Kim Mathison, outgoing President of Friends of Cook Memorial Library, graciously accepted the "Sue Palmatier Award for Outstanding Support by a Friends Group" from Conrad Moses, President of NHLTA. To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tamworth Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the 9th of March, 2010, polls to be open for voting on Article 1 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, and to close not earlier than 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon, and you are hereby notified to meet at the Kenneth A. Brett School in said Town of Tamworth on Wednesday, the 10th of March, 2010, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening for the deliberative session of the Town Meeting at which time action will be taken upon the remaining articles of this warrant.

The moderator went over the rules of the hall and then asked Peg Custer to lead the invocation in remembrance of Heather Moir. The moderator asked Chief Daniel Poirier to speak. Chief Poirier spoke of the hiring of a new police officer, Dana Littlefield, on the 29th of March, and that same officer would be attending the academy on the 26th of April. Concurrently, Officer Penny Frechette in a short ceremony accompanied by the Board of Selectmen and Sergeant Ted Colby from Madison was pinned for her promotion to Sergeant, as well as to fill the Prosecutor's position for the Town of Tamworth.
