Land use forum – Agriculture and Forestry

Planning Board members in attendance at this forum were – Dom Bergen, Nicole Maher-Whiteside, Steve Gray, David Little, and Becca Boyden

Nicole Maher-Whiteside moderated this discussion.

NM - If there is a need for land use regulation, what is it?

- I have a vision of what I'd like to see, but how does regulation affect that?
- NM What is that vision?
- Vibrant active local agriculture, local foods, economic opportunity. Maintaining the landscape.
- Economic segment based on agriculture. How can govt. enable that. Make sure government doesn't get in the way.
- NY Times article from October 2008 "Unite around food to save ailing town" help create vision for local food eceonomy.
- This vision is needed prior to forming regulations.
- There is a difference between "museum landscape" and "working landscape"
- Be careful about where industry is allowed.
- NM- People are concerned that cottage industry should be allowed anywhere in town.
- Difficult to enforce/determine what is "cottage"
- The intensity of the business Agriculture vs. manufacturing Agri-Business
- NM The issue surrounding land use regulation is "What COULD happen". Is there a need for particular rules regarding land use?
- Partnerships between town/family farms/non-profits, etc to make sure that prime agricultural land is not developed. Find the best entity to protect the land. Encourage cluster housing and denser village center.
- What if the rules are the to protect the land, but the cost to live there is too much?

- Is there affordable housing/
- Could agricultural building be put into current use tax guidelines?
- A certain level of farm income on taxations could determine whether something would meet current use guidelines.
- Exemptions might be able to be done, similar to elderly exemption, on a State level.
- People must talk to their neighbors, inform them of their intentions.
- Likes Rural Residential regulations
- Encourage cluster housing and move other businesses into commercial areas.
- Land use regulations makes people have to communicate their intentions to the community. An orderly system works because people know what the system should be.
- NM What you are trying to do is to have people talk to each other.
- What can we do, outside of government, to facilitate the communication.
- Sustainable Tamworth
- Would like to see slaughter facility in town
- Defining intensity can be very difficult
- The first thing to do is define which parts of town will be agricultural. Variances can be made on zoning.
- NM Is there good reason to try to make rules based on fears in the future?
- Intensity level could be determined by "Are you taking good care of your facilities.
- NM Tamworth has a lot of opportunity. The village is not vibrant at this point. Businesses struggle to stay afloat. It is a normal shift. Economies change as cultures change. How do you plan for an uncertain future? What do we care about? Do we need a rule? We need to be careful about making too many rules.
- We have to start somewhere. It is DIRE now. We have to get a handle on it. Don't avoid the issues.
- There is a need to be concerned about the future and to protect, but also, how do you support agriculture? How do we use town government to enable, but not restrict and prevent?
- Should we protect flood plain for future?

- Why protect it if it is not currently being used for agriculture?
- Bank your resources, save it for later in case you need it.
- Why doesn't the Town buy it to protect it?
- Weston Mass. Did this to protect their land for use in forestry and farming]
- NM Is that something you could live with? Preparing for future agricultural use that is not currently being used?
- We need a vision and leadership
- How do you get into farming with no resources to start with.
- Is the Planning Board trying to decide what, if any, rules are going to be written?
- NM NO. The Master Plan found that people wanted some type of land use regulation.
 These forums are to give everyone a voice in what should happen. The next step is to form a committee, consisting of 3 planning board members and 4 community members, to formulate some type of plan to present to the voters.
- What is the timeframe?
- NM Can not commit to an answer. Some would like to see it at this year's town meeting, but that is not likely. Citizen participation in the process is critical.
